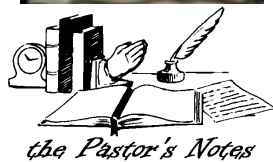

By now most of you have heard that my vehicle was burglarized just before I left for Phoenix on March 28th. One of the “necessaries” stolen was my calendar. Since returning from the West I feel that I’ve been flying blind, so to speak.

My apologies if I’ve missed any meetings that had been scheduled. This time I’ve had a good excuse!

It’s been amazing to me regarding the commitments I remembered and the ones I didn’t. I asked Denise in our office to copy all meetings she knew I was to attend; likewise I received the same information from Lesley in The Center of Spiritual Life. That helped a great deal. I remembered all of my planned home visitations and all of the counseling appointments set up for pre-marital planning. For the most part I had remembered most of the congregational and University related meetings and having their lists helped fill in the gaps.

What I’ve missed consistently are the District meetings, the Annual Conference meetings, and fun events scheduled with friends in Indianapolis. During these last four weeks I’ve received nu-

merous calls that begin with “where were you ...” I apologize and explain my situation. Usually people understand.

What if the same would happen to you? What commitments would still be in your head and what appointments might be forgotten? Would others show understanding?

You and I have priorities. Sometimes these are revealed to us by our calendars, our schedules, our commitments. At other times they are discounted by those items we simply use to fill up time. Usually we don’t need a calendar to remind us of our children’s birthdays, our anniversaries, or holiday gatherings with family and friends. However, weekly meetings can become routine and we simply forget why such meetings mattered to us to begin with. There are some commitments we keep because we think we are responsible for doing so. There are other commitments we keep because ... we no longer have a reason for keeping them. And soon without the reminder of our calendars we forget to attend.

May is filled with many special occasions. You’ll want to remember Mother’s Day, graduation events, and Memo-

rial Weekend if for no other reason than the 500 Race. You’ll want to remember birthdays and anniversaries. You’ll feel the need to remember business meetings, weekly clubs, and monthly responsibilities.

What you remember without a calendar reveals your commitments. And maybe it’s time to make a few adjustments to your schedule and to your life. I’m realizing that I had become so attached to my immediate work commitments that I’d “forgotten” fun events scheduled with friends. That needs to change! I’d forgotten District meetings and Annual Conference meetings, those places where I feel connected to the network of the greater church beyond my own neighborhood. I need to intentionally move my awareness and involvement beyond my own little corner of the world. It is time my calendar of scheduled events parallels my priorities.

That’s just one of the things I’m learning from this lab of experiences we call life. I hope that it doesn’t take being burglarized for you to do the same.

Finance Update

The members of the Finance Committee want to thank everyone for their Extravagant Generosity in supporting Gobin's ministry. We are through the first quarter of 2011 and so far Gobin's financial situation is holding steady. Our budgeted income from Sunday morning offerings for the General Fund (what we use for everyday bills and to fund our ministry together) is about \$38,850 through the first quarter of the year. We have received almost \$42,200. While some of this is from people who give in one annual amount in January, everyone has been doing a great job of providing financial support so far this year. Additionally, we have raised over \$1500 via two fundraisers. Keep up the good work!

The Finance Committee would also like to let everyone know that we are pursuing a couple of different options for completing an audit of our 2010 finances as required by our Indiana Conference of the United Methodist Church. Additionally, we have implemented policies to more closely monitor our bank accounts and the flow of money into and out of them. Anyone wishing to see these policies can obtain a copy in the church office.

Thanks again for your financial support of Gobin ministries and for all you do to be the hands of Christ in our community.

CHANGE THE WORLD WEEK!

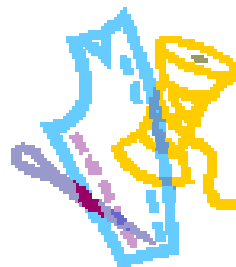

2nd Quarter Mission—Johnson Nichols Health Clinic

As I write this, the social agencies created to help low-income families, will not be "defunded"—but who knows what will occur in the near future? One of those agencies which we have designated as our second quarter mission project, is the Johnson Nichols Health Clinic. Drs. James B. Johnson and Anne Nichols created this service in the early '70s to reach out to low-income women and children in Putnam County for family planning services, immunizations, children's well-child physicals and Pap testing. Dr. Johnson, a Gobin member, was the Medical Director who authorized the standing orders and protocols. The Clinic was first held in a house on Maple Street owned by Francis Hickman, another Gobin member. The Clinic shared space with Head Start.

Volunteers helped with making appointments, picking up clients all over the county, and even helping with fundraising. A director, a nurse and a doctor were the only minimally paid staff. Many volunteers were also Gobin members.

Slowly through the years, the Clinic gained trust and recognition by the medical community and city and county residents, to the point where the Clinic now receives funding from the Indiana State Department of Health, Title X, XX and WIC Federal funds and from the Putnam County United Way as well as donations.

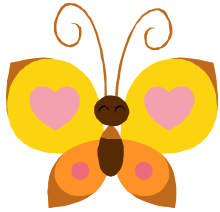
However, expansion to another clinic in Spencer; a larger professional staff; greater demand for medical supplies; a much larger clientele; and a weak economy have caused pressure for more funding. The Johnson Nichols Health Clinic is now a service of Centerstone, adding "integrated behavioral healthcare including evaluation, treatment and referral" to the long list of Clinic services.

Compared to the '70s they now offer preventative physicals for children as well as for well child care, diagnosis and treatment of sexually transmitted infections, education and prenatal substance abuse prevention, and screening for lead poisoning as well as the above mentioned services.

Here are a few statistics to reveal the impact of the Clinic. They performed 1,125 family-planning services in 2010, 376 free pregnancy tests, 1,593 children's immunizations, and services for 745 infants and children. Patients are counseled on healthy weight levels and education on nutrition and exercise as well.

Pretty impressive!.....All the good work and results would be lost if their Federal funding of Titles X,XX and WIC were cut drastically. The Mission Committee urges your generous donations to the Johnson Nichols Health Clinic mission project for the 2nd quarter. This Clinic has had a long and successful history, and its connection with Gobin UM Church makes it an important mission to support. The goal is \$2000. Thank you for helping to support this worthy cause!!

The next gathering of Gobin Alive will be on Friday, May 6th beginning at 6:00pm at Airy Knob Farm, the home of Vic & Linda Hunter. Bring some chili to share with others and discuss. Wrap-up will be around 9:30pm. Come back at 8:30am on Saturday, May 7th (breakfast is on your own) with discussion, programming, dinner at 6:30pm and a celebration and blessing which will begin at 8:30pm.

Peace and Justice for May

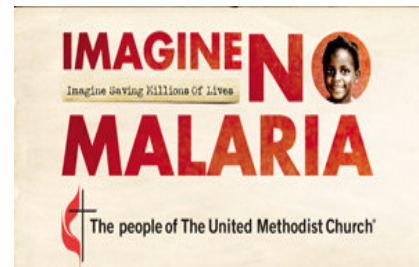

Justice, Mercy and Humility: A Reflection on Micah 6:8

Micah 6:8 (NIV) The Lord has shown you what is good, o man, and what does he require of you? To act justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God.

Justice: We are called to do justice and not just to believe in justice or study justice. Followers of Christ are called to speak and act on the behalf of those who lack influence. We must go where Jesus is going, do what Jesus is doing, and be who Jesus is being for the lame, the poor, the sick, and the marginalized.

Malaria was eliminated in the United States in the 1950's. Since that time there have been few major advances in either the prevention or treatment of malaria. The best vaccine we have yet developed is only 70% effective and just made it to human trials last year! Why is it that 60 years after malaria was eliminated in the United States, a mother, father, brother or sister loses a beloved child to this disease every 45 seconds? Have we forgotten to do justice?



Mercy: We must love mercy; we must be living demonstrations of God's mercy. But what does this mean?

In his book *Change the World* Rev. Mike Slaughter, the pastor of one of the largest churches in United Methodism, had this to say about mercy: "Mercy is closely related to grace – receiving what one doesn't deserve or hasn't earned... a gospel worldview begins with the premise that God accepts me, demonstrated through the redemptive offering of his Son on the cross, in spite of my brokenness and failures. Because of God's mercy and grace, I am accepted and now free to work at being the person God created me to be. Mercy is the generous demonstration of indescribable grace!"

Through programs like Imagine No Malaria, we are showing our love of mercy. Perhaps that mercy hasn't been earned, but the Lord calls us to reflect the love of Christ to those near and far so that "they will know we are Christians by our love."

Humility: To walk humbly with our Lord means to accept that this life really isn't about us. It's about God. To serve with humility means to serve as Jesus served — without expectation for self-gain — to the sinners, the tax collectors and a whole host of others whom we might wish weren't included in our neighborhood. To serve with humility means to look for Jesus in every person you meet, humbly accepting that you are no better than the least among them.

Imagine No Malaria seeks to make it not about us, but about God. How can we live into his will for his kingdom? How can we look for Jesus among the children of Africa? How can we humbly walk with the Lord through the streets of poverty, seeking to do the Lord's work?

Prayer: Father, there is much work to be done in your kingdom. How might I be a part of it? How can I act justly, love mercy and walk humbly with you? Lord, thank you for the precious gift of your Son. Through his death on the cross you have shown your grace and mercy, offering redemption to all, even me. Show me, Father, the path that leads to you and how I can let others know my love for you through word and deed. Amen.
