In America, it began at Ginghamburg. For the world it began at Kwang Lim Methodist Church in Seoul, Korea. I had the privilege of visiting that congregation in 1995.

Kwang Lim was a tiny rural area outside of Seoul when Sundo Kim (Kim, Sundo) became the pastor in 1971. With a membership of 170 it wrestled with a vision, any vision, of how it might survive into the future. When I visited in 1995 it had over 78,000 members with seven packed Sunday worship services in a sanctuary that held 6,000 and thousands more attended satellite services throughout the city. More importantly, it had over 63,000 persons attending weekly Bible study in groups of no more than twelve participants.

The “secret” to Kwang Lim’s growth was from a model of ministry that traces itself back to John and Charles Wesley. Those who join and regularly participate in a small group ministry setting will spiritually develop. From the “class meetings” to the camps to the revival events that produced something

new in the United States called “Sunday school,” the strength of the Methodist movement has always been these small gatherings of dedicated Christians willing to grow. Growth means moving beyond your current understanding of self. Growth means being asked to do things you never would have considered in a million years. Growth means being around people you have never liked and even listening to their ideas and insights that might become a blessing for you. Growth means being pushed outside of your comfort zone.

Ginghamburg United Methodist Church is in a small community north of Dayton, Ohio. Michael Slaughter became the pastor in 1979. He visited at Kwang Lim and studied briefly with Bishop Sundo Kim. He came back to the States with a new vision. He also met a great deal of resistance from that small rural congregation that felt it definitely knew what would work in ministry and church growth even though it hadn’t worked there in years. With a worship average in the 90s and a membership of 118 in 1979, Ginghamburg is now a congregation of over

4,500. The strength of its growth has been its small group ministry program (called “cells”) and the development and training of laity in leadership.

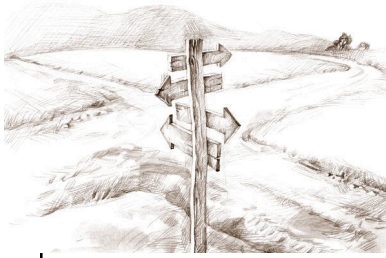
Ann Handshu was on staff at Ginghamburg before moving to Terre Haute. She now serves as the Disciple Leadership Coordinator for the West District of the United Methodist Church in Indiana. Several in Gobin Memorial have already attended her trainings throughout the District on Staff-Parish Relations, Lay Leadership (nominations), and Administrative/Church Council. She has agreed to preach during our Stewardship Pledge Sunday on October 9<sup>th</sup>. In fact, she told us that she would be willing to preach that Sunday as long as she didn’t have to mention the word money!

It all goes back to vision, and a “new” vision of parish ministry is unfolding and blossoming all across the world! You think Methodism has lost its way? You simply haven’t heard all the success stories of what is currently happening! I invite you to come.

## GOBIN AT A CROSSROADS?

As Gobin prepares for ministry in the community into the future, we need to be sure our church building will meet our ministry needs. Additionally, our surroundings may change as DePauw makes changes to campus in our vicinity. To help us decide what, if any, changes should be made, a subgroup of the Crossroads team met with one architect and plans to meet with another.

These firms specialize in church architecture. These have been preliminary meetings to determine what our next step should be and what costs would be associated with moving forward. One possibility is to ask one of the architects to provide more detailed assessment of our current facilities, evaluation of possible future needs, and preliminary plans for changes to the church building. Exploring these possibilities will require us to pay for these services. We will need to determine the best way to cover those costs.

One suggestion has been made that we examine the use of the settlement dollars we just acquired. **On Sunday, September 25 there will be a meeting following worship at which you are invited to ask questions and provide input about how Gobin should proceed.**

## Second Sunday of Stewardship

On Sunday, October 2, Nathan Kober will be talking about his recent experience in South Africa from a stewardship perspective. Nathan is a senior majoring in Bio-Chemistry at DePauw University from Conklin, Michigan. He attends Gobin regularly.



## MISSIONS COMMITTEE UPDATES

### 3rd Quarter Mission—A-Way Home Shelter


Gobin's third quarter mission project which ended at the end of September is the A-Way Home Shelter. As you may be aware, the A-Way Home Shelter has temporarily closed its doors. It has hired a consultant from Bloomington that is an advocate for sheltering the homeless. He is reviewing the shelter's processes to determine how best to proceed with the finances of the shelter. The shelter board is committed to opening the shelter in 2012. There may be a matching grant in place by October.

We promise to be good stewards of the funds we have collected and will make sure they are used to help the shelter open its doors again.

### 4th Quarter Missions—Mary Allison Children's Fund

Beginning in October, we will begin collecting funds for the Mary Allison Children's Fund.

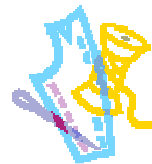

## PEACE AND JUSTICE OCTOBER 2011

First, I would like to introduce to you Juergen Wawrzyczyk (pronounced Vav-ricks-zik) who came from Germany last Thursday, Sept 8 to spend the year in Greencastle attending our High School and “having a cultural experience” of America. He is from Bavaria, specifically, Nurnberg, and was chosen by the Council on International Educational Exchange or CIEE. He is 16 years old and will be attending St. Paul’s on Saturday’s at 5 p.m. for Mass and after one Sunday at Gobin, also wants to attend here on Sunday morning with Newtons and Watsons. Though he has only finished 9 years of school, they have placed him in 11<sup>th</sup> grade so he can have the broadest introduction to US History, US Literature, Pre-Calculus, World History, Environmental Studies, Government, and a study hall. On a scale of 5, with 5 being the best, his spoken English is a 4. So be sure to talk to him! He also speaks Serbian and Croatian as his mother and grandparents are Bosnian. His father is Polish. He brings perspective on 3 old world cultures.

Juergen has a 12 year old younger sister named Corina. His mother is Ivanka, who is a housewife, and his father is Eduard, employed at Bosch, a large German manufacturer. Juergen really likes pets, so if you have some, please invite him over as the Newtons have none! Juergen is easy to get along with, and “always has a smile on his face” according to his mother, and I agree. Please help us make him feel at home (and not homesick) in Greencastle. Thanks.

Second, I missed the seminar on Thursday I was to hear on the internet about Poverty in our Society, as I was enrolling Juergen in school. However, I heard the statistics reported last night and it is NOT good. Please ponder this information and decide if there is anything you can do to help.

- 15% of Americans live in poverty. This is the highest percentage in 50 years!
- 2 ½ million more people live in poverty now than in 2009 which is only 2 years ago.
- Many more people live in extreme poverty now which is an income of less than \$5000.
- The poverty rate for Americans who are Black or Latino has gone up.

As discussed on the news last night, the question is: Do we need a better safety net for children and families who are below the poverty line of \$22,314 for a family of 4?



## KROGER AND SCRIP PROGRAMS: EASY FUNDRAISER FOR GOBIN



Do you shop at Kroger for groceries? If you do, then make sure you get your Kroger Gift Card from Denise in the church office. For \$5 you can purchase a Kroger gift card from Gobin that has \$5 on it. Take it to Kroger's Customer Service Desk and add whatever amount you'd like to add on the card. Purchase your groceries at Kroger, pay for the groceries with your Kroger Gift Card, and Gobin receives 3% of all your purchases. It couldn't be easier. Pick up your Kroger Gift Card from Denise TODAY!!



Gobin also participates in the SCRIP program. Look to see what companies and services participate in the SCRIP program. Pay Gobin the amount of the gift card(s) you'd like to receive by Tuesdays at 11am. Denise will put in the order and will receive the orders by Friday afternoon. You can pick them up late Friday afternoon or get them on Sunday at the worship service. This benefits the church by giving a certain percentage of each gift card purchase to Gobin. For example, if you order a \$100 Wal-Mart card, the church will receive \$2 just because you ordered the gift card. Most companies offer percentages from 4-12%. There are almost 6 pages of companies and services that work with the SCRIP program.
